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## CITYWIDE TRENDS

- New York City's population declined in 2021, continuing recent population trends and exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- NYC's public school enrollment experienced a parallel dip in the last two years.
- As the city continues to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, the DOE remains committed to thoughtful collaboration with districts and communities to collectively strengthen schools and support students and families.

- K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 10\% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year.

- Although K-12 school enrollment in district 1-32 and charter schools has declined by about $11 \%$ since the 2017-2018 school year, high school enrollment has declined by only $5 \%$ during this time.


## DISTRICT PLANNING PROCESS

## RECENT SCHOOL CHANGES

- The Office of District Planning partners with superintendents and communities to address district needs in accordance with Chancellor's Regulation A-190.
- Chancellor's Regulation A-190 governs the process to make any major changes to school utilization such as co-locations, school mergers, grade expansions and truncations, re-sitings, and other changes. A-190 proposals are voted on by the Panel for Educational Policy (PEP).
- Guiding Questions:
- How might recent changes affect district/borough needs as they are implemented? Do they address key needs and priorities?
- What other school changes should be considered?

- In the 2023-2024 School Year, Bard High School Early College Bronx (12X641) opened, partnering with Bard College to enable high school students to move in four years from $9^{\text {th }}$ grade through the first two years of college, earning a high school diploma up to sixty college credits, and an Associate of Arts degree from Bard college upon graduation.
- In the 2023-2024 School Year, Jonas Bronck Academy (10X228) expanded from a 6-8 school to a 6-12 School.


## ENROLLMENT

## UNPACKING ENROLLMENT TRENDS

- Enrollment is a key data component in the District Planning Process. Enrollment data helps us identify trends, make hypotheses, and understand where we need to dig deeper in partnership with our stakeholders.
- Guiding Questions:
- What has happened to borough enrollment over the last six years overall? Are there notable trends?
- Are students remaining in the borough to attend school? If not, where are they going?
- Are students residing in other boroughs enrolling in large numbers?

- District 10 enrolls a significantly larger number of high school students compared to other districts in the Bronx.
- Over the last five school years, the number of students attending high school declined in every Bronx district.
- The smallest decrease is in District 10 , at $8 \%$, while the largest decrease is in District 12 , at $26 \%$.
- Over the past year, high school enrollment remained stable in District 8 and decreased only slightly in Districts 9, 10, and 12.

- District 11 has the smallest percentage of students enrolled in charter schools (1\%) among Bronx districts, followed by District 10 (12\%).
- District 7 has the largest percentage of students enrolled in charter schools (33\%) among Bronx districts, followed by Districts 8 (27\%), 12 (24\%), and 9 (17\%).

- Over the past five years, the number of school-aged children in the Bronx declined by $9 \%$.
- Over the past five years, the share of Bronx high school-aged residents enrolling in district schools declined by four percentage points, and the share of Bronx high school-aged residents enrolling in charter schools grew by five percentage points.

- In the Bronx, Districts 10 and 12 have the highest percentages of students attending district high schools within their district of residence.
- $57 \%$ of Bronx high school-aged residents attended high school in the Bronx, which is the second lowest borough retention in the city.

- Similar to the 2019-2020 school year, in the 2022-2023 school year, $67 \%$ of $8^{\text {th }}$ grade students attending Bronx district high schools continued to attend district schools in the Bronx for $9^{\text {th }}$ grade.
- While some Bronx middle school families chose other options for high school, such as district high schools in other boroughs, charter schools, or non-public schools, family choices remained relatively similar from the 20192-2020 to the 2022-2023 school years.

- Several Bronx high schools experienced large enrollment declines since 2017.
- School for Excellence and High School for Violin and Dance are co-located in the same building. School for Excellence's enrollment declined by 73\% and High School for Violin and Dance's enrollment declined by $51 \%$ over the past five years. Both schools serve fewer than 150 students.


## HIGH DEMAND HIGH SCHOOLS IN THE BRONX

- Examining high demand schools can help identify models or programs that may be serving students well and inform other changes in the district through the planning process.

- The list above shows the ten schools with the greatest number of Fall 2023 applicants for $9^{\text {th }}$ grade in the Bronx.
- Mott Hall V is in the eastern part of District 12, where there is a significant deficit of middle school seats.
- Alfred E. Smith is a CTE school that is $56 \%$ utilized and might benefit from increasing its seat target.

- The above high school enrollment and capacity chart is a helpful way to think about borough-wide seat availability compared to actual enrollment.
- There is an excess of high school seats across all districts in the Bronx, particularly in District 10.


## BUILDINGS \& CAPACITY

## SCHOOL \& BUILDING UTILIZATION

- The Office of District Planning works closely with the School Construction Authority (SCA) and the Office of Space Planning to understand how buildings are currently used and how capacity can best be used in future years.
- Each year, the SCA publishes the Blue Book, a tool that analyzes the capacity of each DOE building across the City and compares the target capacity with the number of enrolled students to determine a utilization rate for the building.
- Guiding Questions:
- Is over- or under-utilization concentrated in certain districts or particular areas?
- Are there overcrowded buildings that need to be alleviated? What is enrollment like for schools in these buildings?
- Are there under-utilized buildings with excess capacity to accommodate an additional school or program?

- There are 87 buildings in the Bronx serving high school students.
- 42 DOE buildings with high school students are under-utilized, meaning there is an excess of seats in these buildings.
- District Planning works collaboratively with communities to identify how to optimize excess space in buildings, including adding programming where demand aligns to space.
- 6 buildings with high school students are over-utilized, which suggests there may be crowding and/or space challenges at those schools.

- Utilization rates do not always capture the full narrative of space in a building but provide a starting point for assessing potential space availability. For example, some buildings, although under-utilized, may not have sufficient space to add new schools or programming.
- Other buildings have significant excess seats and rooms.
- These could be candidates to address pressing district needs, including adding or expanding programs such as dual language offerings, District 75 programming, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Nest and Horizon programs, and/or other district needs where demand aligns.

- Schools in these buildings may experience high demand, and therefore may be programming creatively to accommodate students.
- District 10 has the greatest number of over-utilized buildings in the borough.

## DISTRICT 75 SEAT NEED

## District 75

- NYCDOE's District 75 provides highly specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), significant cognitive delays, emotional disturbance, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities.
- District 75 serves students through a number of different program models designed for students of different ages and education needs.
- Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools
- A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.
- Guiding Questions:
- Does the district have a need for more District 75 seats?
- Are there potential options for new D75 sites to provide opportunities for students to attend programs closer to their homes?

- District 75 serves students in a variety of settings across Bronx high schools based on the IEPs of individual students.
- Overall, the Bronx has enough seats to accommodate all District 75 high school students. However, seat capacity varies significantly across districts.
- There is currently a deficit of high school District 75 seats in Districts 8,9 , and 10 . District 9 does not have any high school District 75 seats, which is likely to result in a much longer commute for these students to receive services.

- Across the Bronx, 60\% of high school students identify as Hispanic, $26 \%$ identify as Black, $6 \%$ identify as Asian, $4 \%$ identify as White, and $4 \%$ identify as Other.
- The racial breakdown of high schools in Districts 7 and 9 most closely resembles the borough.
- Districts 9 and 12 serve the highest percentage of Hispanic students. District 11 serves a higher percentage of Black students compared to the borough average.
- District 10 serves the highest percentage of Asian students in the Bronx, significantly higher than the borough average.

- About $22 \%$ of students in Bronx high schools have Individualized Educational Programs (IEPs).
