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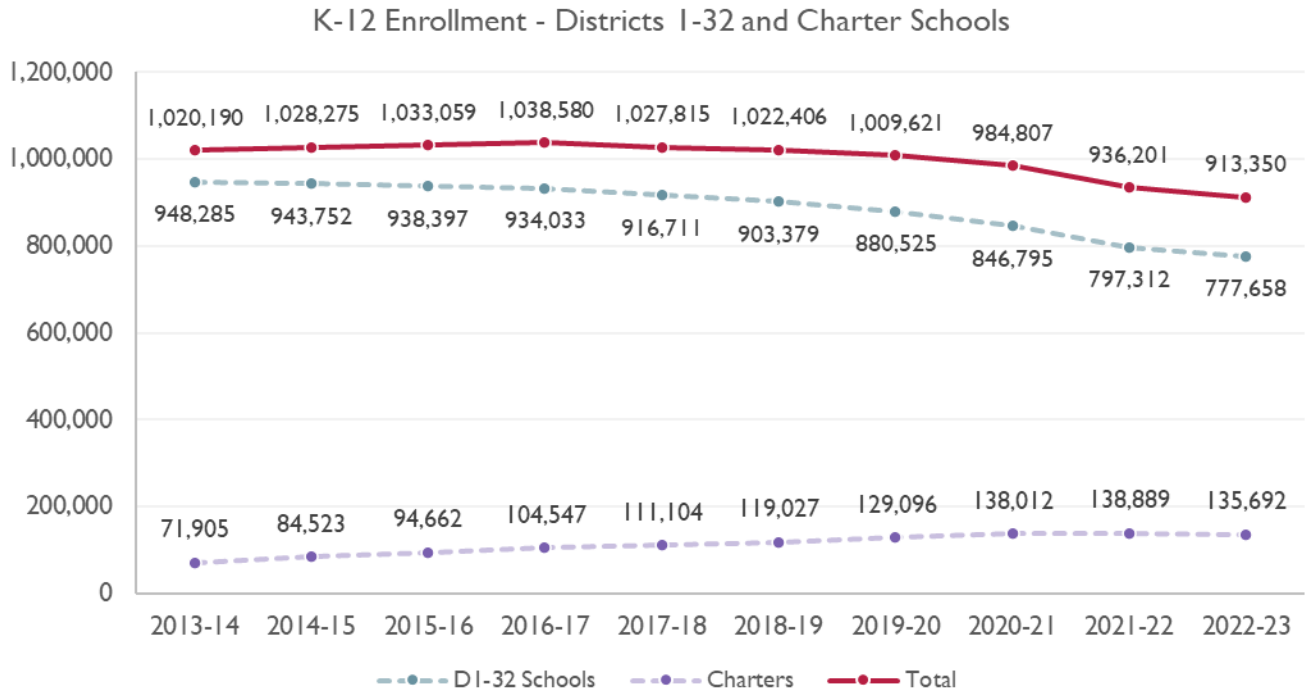
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CITYWIDE TRENDS

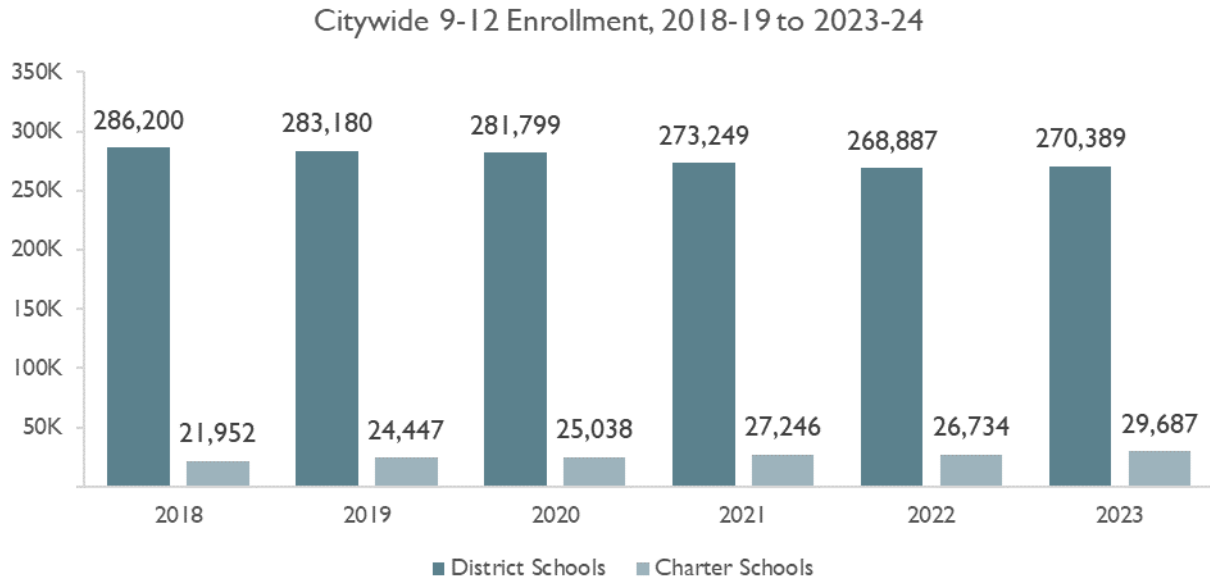
CITYWIDE ENROLLMENT (DISTRICT AND CHARTER), 2013-14 TO 2022-23



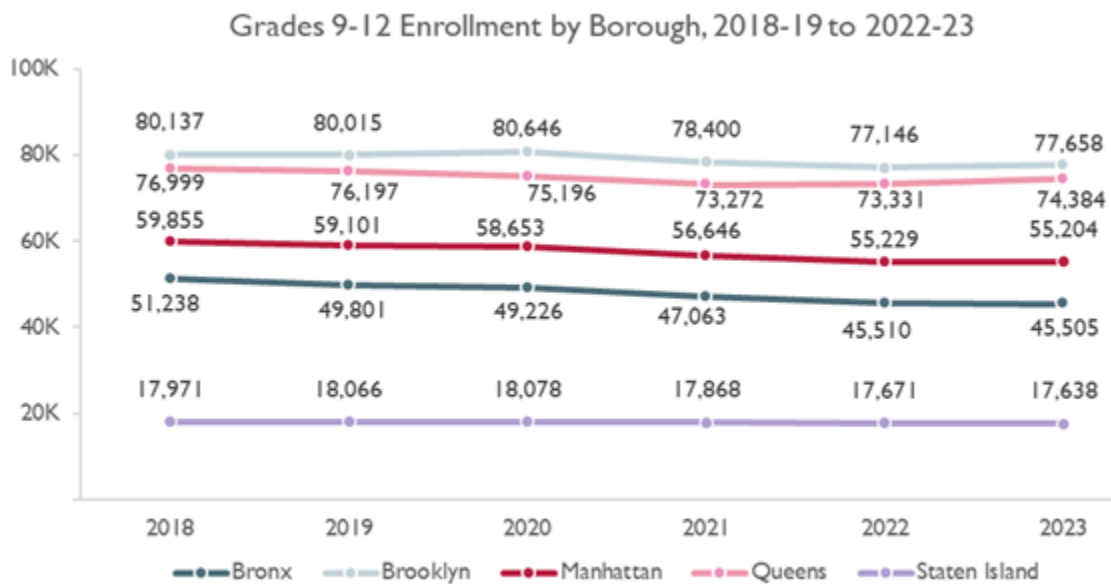

- Enrollment in D1-32 schools remained stable in 2023-2024 after declining by about 12% in the three school years since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Overall, K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 11% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year.

- Similar to K-12 trends overall, high school enrollment in D1-32 schools remained stable in 2023-2024 after steady decreases for years prior.
 - There are currently about 46,000 high school students enrolled in the Bronx.
- High school enrollment in charter schools has increased by 35% since the 2018-2019 school year, now comprising about 10% of high school students in public schools.

DISTRICT PLANNING PROCESS

RECENT SCHOOL CHANGES

- The Office of District Planning partners with superintendents and communities to address district needs in accordance with Chancellor’s Regulation A-190.
 - **Chancellor’s Regulation A-190** governs the process to make any major changes to school utilization such as co-locations, school mergers, grade expansions and truncations, re-sitings, and other changes. A-190 proposals are voted on by the Panel for Educational Policy (PEP).
- Guiding Questions:
 - How might recent changes affect district/borough needs as they are implemented? Do they address key needs and priorities?
 - What other school changes should be considered?

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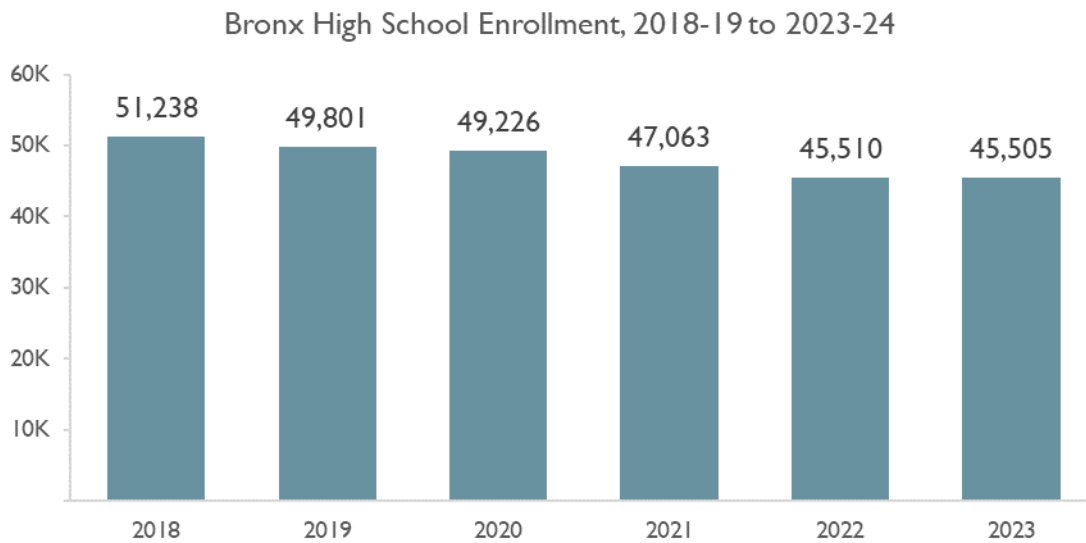
- There have been several high school proposals undertaken in the Bronx over the past few years.
- In the upcoming 2024-25 school year, the following proposals will go into effect:
 - A new District 75 high school site will open in building X884, where it will be co-located with Community School for Social Justice (07X427) and Health Opportunities High School (07X670);
 - School for Excellence will merge with Morris Academy in building X400;
 - Bronx High School for Writing and Communication Arts will merge with Bronx Aerospace High School in building X425; and
 - Beginning in the 2024-25 school year, the co-location of Bard High School Early College Bronx

ENROLLMENT

UNPACKING ENROLLMENT TRENDS

- Enrollment is a key data component in the District Planning Process. Enrollment data helps us identify trends, make hypotheses, and understand where we need to dig deeper in partnership with our stakeholders.
- Guiding Questions:
 - What has happened to borough enrollment over the last six years overall? Are there notable trends?
 - Are students remaining in the borough to attend school? If not, where are they going?
 - Are students residing in other boroughs enrolling in large numbers?

BRONX ENROLLMENT, 2018-19 TO 2023-24

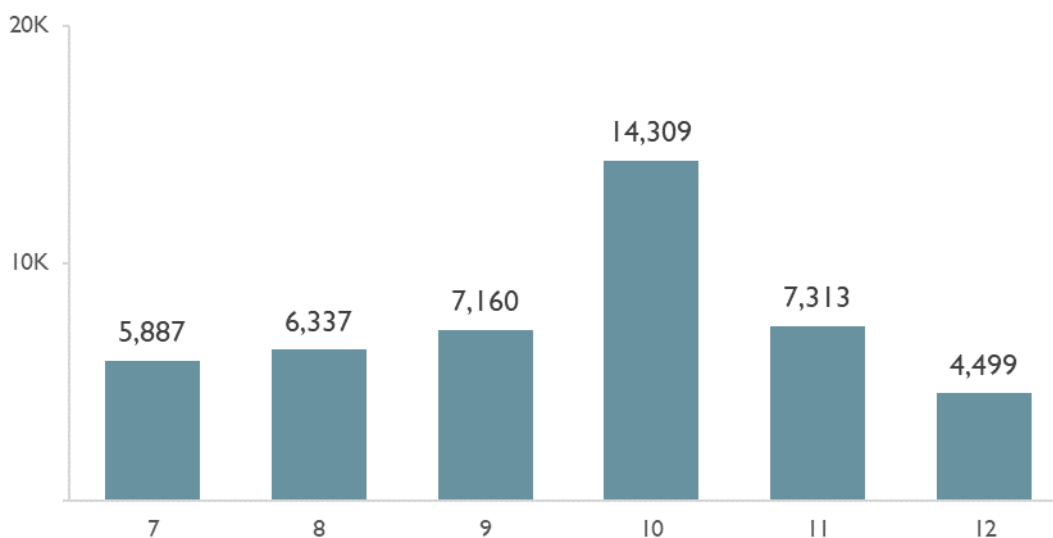

- Over the past five school years, enrollment at high schools in the Bronx decreased by almost 6,000 students (-11%).

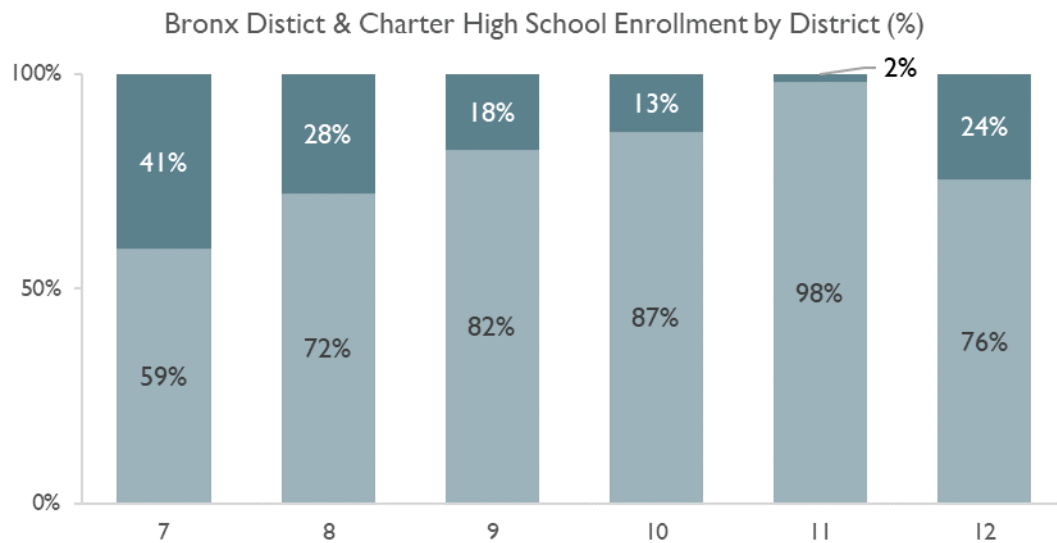
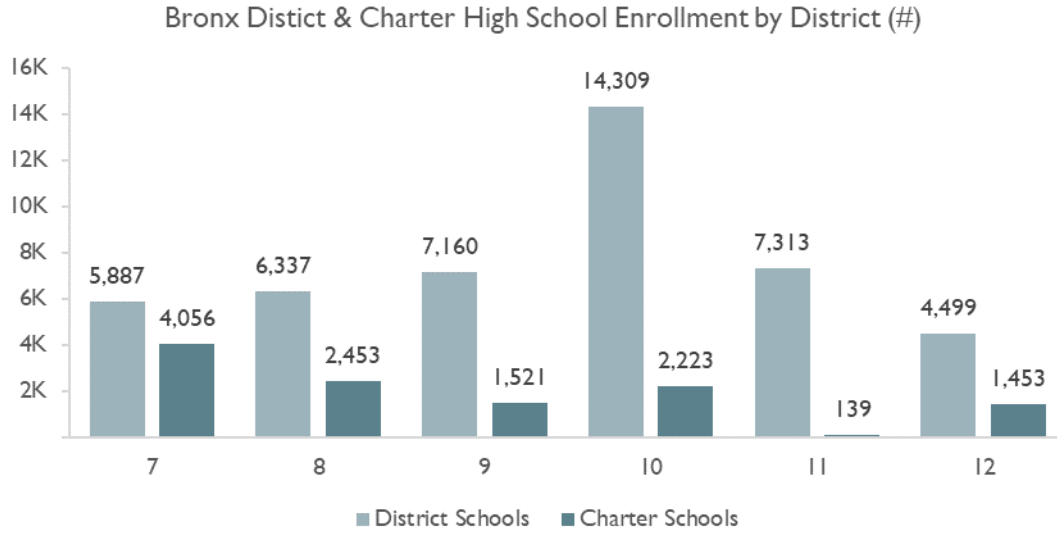

- District 10 enrolls a significantly larger number of high school students compared to other districts in the Bronx.
- Over the last five years, the number of students attending high school declined in every Bronx district. The smallest decrease was in District 10 (-7%), while the largest decrease was in District 12 (-17%).
- However, over the past year, high school enrollment remained stable in every Bronx district.

CHARTER ENROLLMENT IN THE BRONX

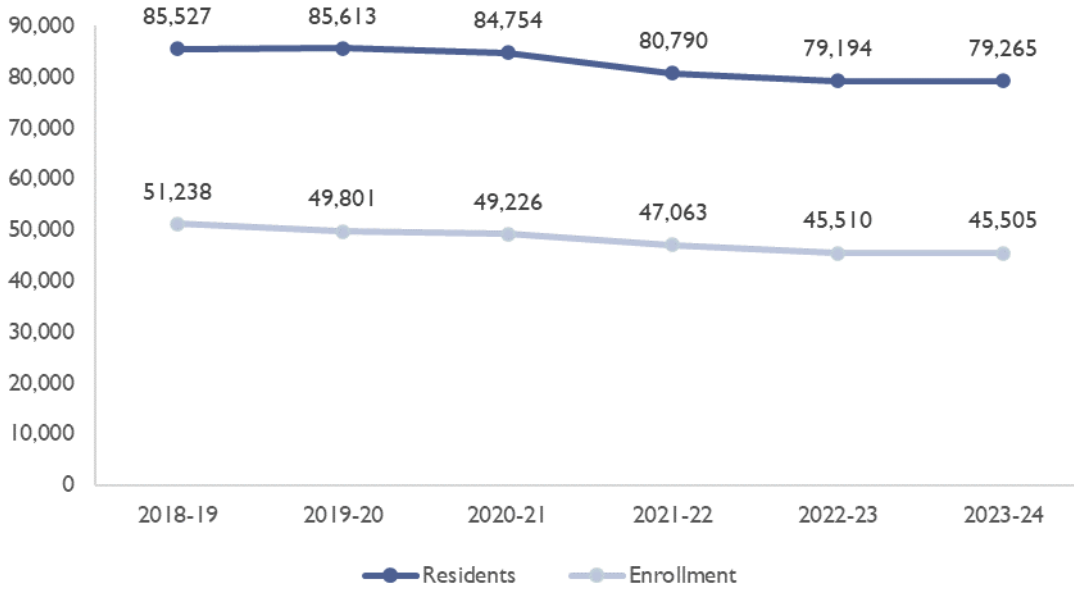

- Among Bronx districts, District 11 has the smallest percentage of high school students enrolled in charter schools (2%), while District 7 has the largest percentage of high school students enrolled in charter school (41%).

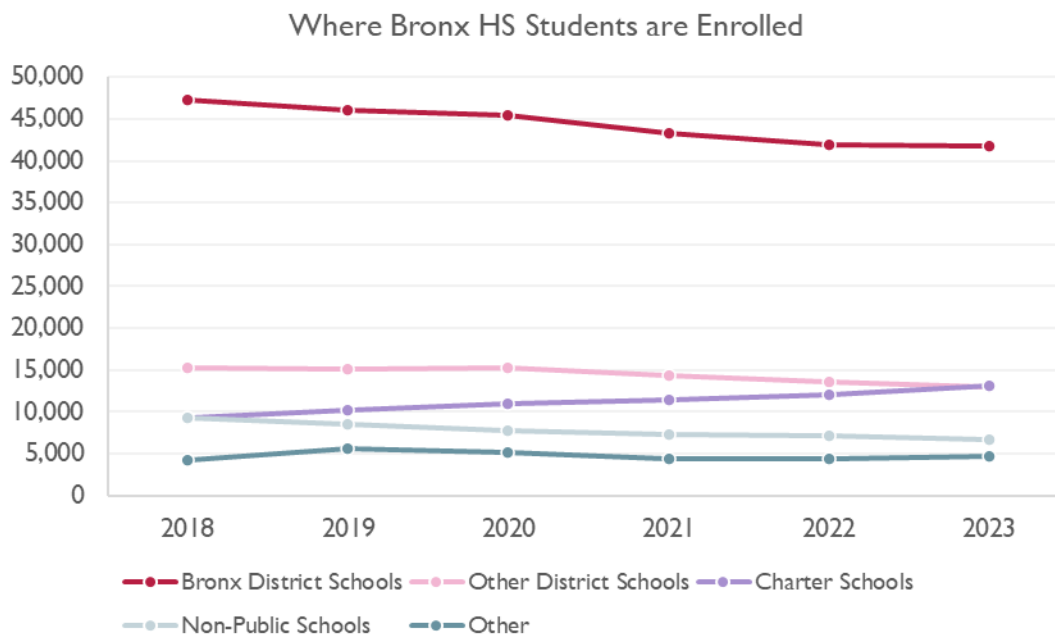

Residential population is presented here as the sum of students attending any NYCPS school, charter or non-public school; as such, this metric will not capture students who are home schooled, have dropped out, or are otherwise not enrolled in these school options.

- Over the past five years, the number of high school aged residents in the Bronx declined by 7%.
 - Over the past five years, all Bronx districts saw declines in their 9-12 aged residents, with the largest decreases seen in Districts 9 and 11 (-10%) and the smallest decrease seen in District 7 (-1%).
- However, in the past year, the number of high school aged residents in the Bronx remained relatively stable.

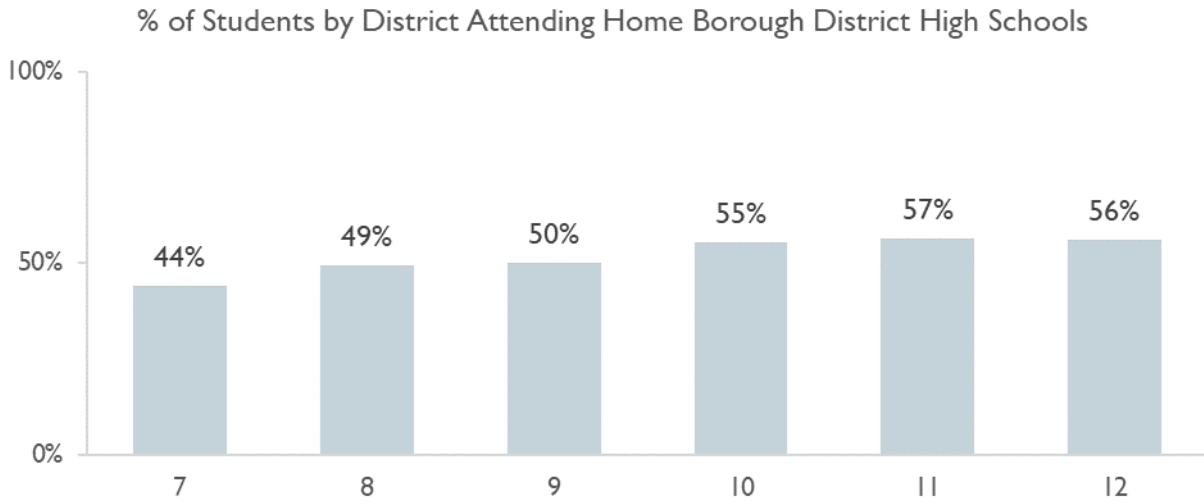

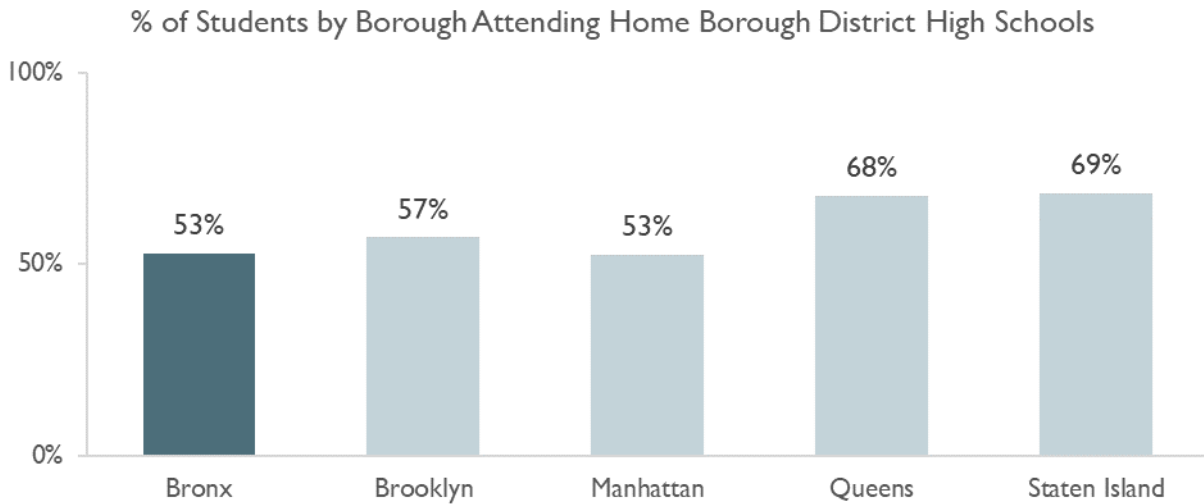
- In the 2023-24 school year, 17% of Bronx high school aged residents enrolled in charter high schools.
 - Over the past five years, the share of Bronx high school aged residents enrolling in charter schools increased by six percentage points.
- In the 2023-24 school year, 53% of Bronx high school aged residents enrolled in Bronx district high schools, while 16% of Bronx 9-12 aged residents enrolled in high schools in other boroughs.

Borough Retention - By District



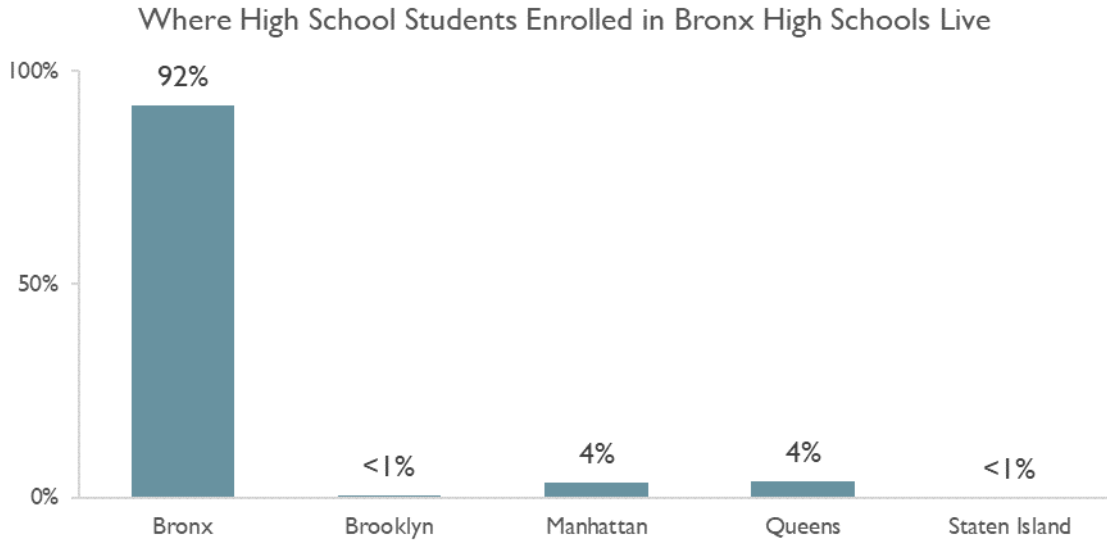

- In the Bronx, Districts 10, 11, and 12 have the highest percentages of students attending district high schools within their district of residence.
- About half (53%) of Bronx high school aged residents attend high school in the Bronx. Together with Manhattan, the Bronx has the lowest borough retention rate.

- Very small percentages of Bronx high school students come from other boroughs.

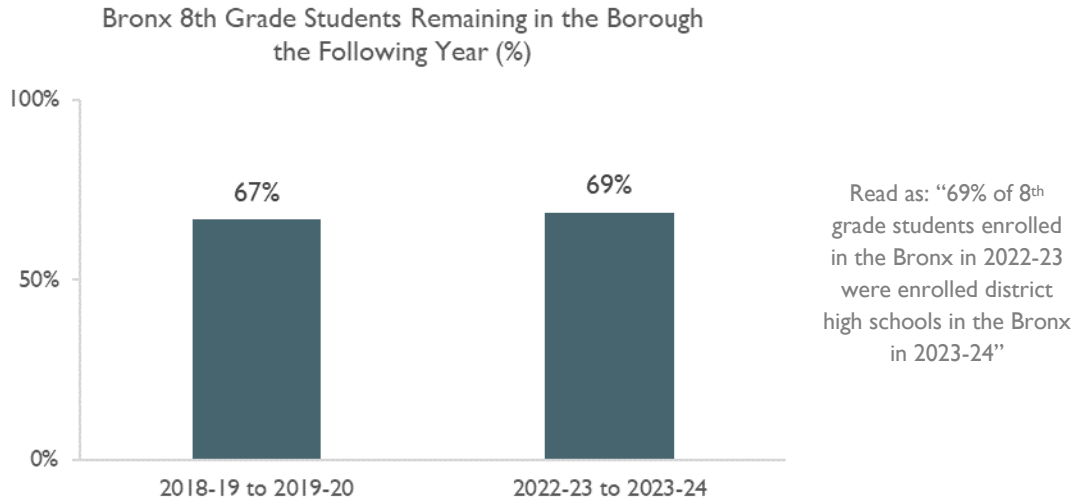

- The primary drivers of the decrease in high school enrollment in the Bronx over the past five years are a decrease in the number of high school aged Bronx residents, a decrease in the number of high school aged residents from other boroughs enrolling in Bronx high schools, and an increase in the number of Bronx high school residents leaving the borough for charter high schools.
 - Over the past five years, the 16% decrease in the number of Bronx high school aged residents leaving the Bronx to attend high school in another borough was not steep enough to outpace the 41% increase in the number of Bronx high school aged residents leaving the borough to attend charter high schools.

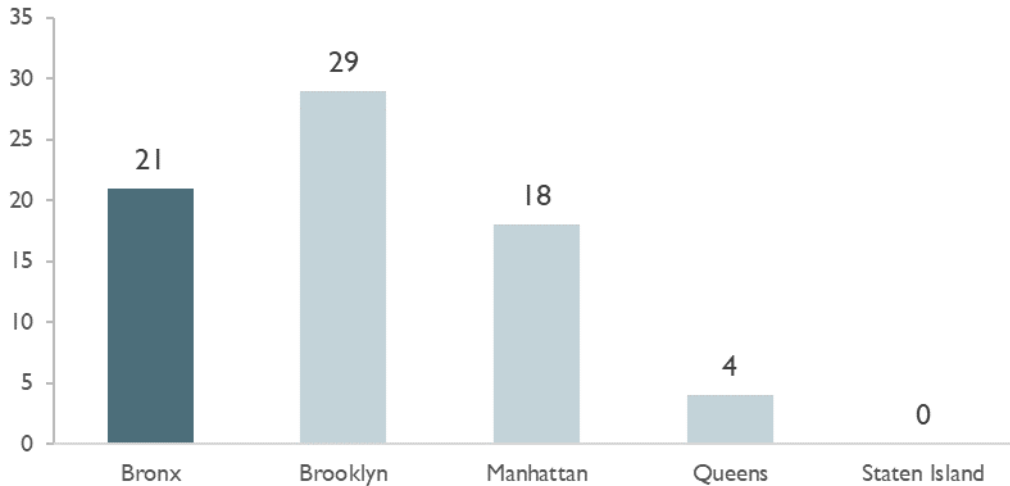
- Enrollment choices after 8th grade in the Bronx remained about the same over the past four years.
- Similar to the 2020-21 school year, in the 2023-24 school year, 69% of 8th grade students in Bronx district schools continued to attend a Bronx district school for high school, while 15% of 8th grade students in Bronx district schools attended a high school in another district.

 - Of the 112 schools serving high school grades in the Bronx, 21 are in the bottom 25% of enrollment citywide.

- Bard High School Early College Bronx is a new school phasing in to building X098.
- School for Excellence will merge with co-located Morris Academy for Collaborative Studies in the 2024-25 school year. High School for Violin and Dance is also co-located in building X400.
- Bronx High School for Writing and Communication Arts will merge with co-located Bronx Aerospace in the 2024-25 school year. Bronx Lab is also co-located in building X425.

- Eight of the ten high demand high schools in the Bronx received more true applications than seats for Fall 2024.
- As stated above, Bard High School Early College Bronx is a new high school phasing in.
- University Heights Secondary School is co-located with Health Opportunities High School, one of the schools in the bottom 25% of enrollment citywide.

ENROLLMENT VS. CAPACITY

- We consider the total number of students and the total number of seats to see if there is a net surplus or deficit of seats within a district.
- Some districts, and particular areas within a district, struggle with over-utilization, while others have excess capacity.

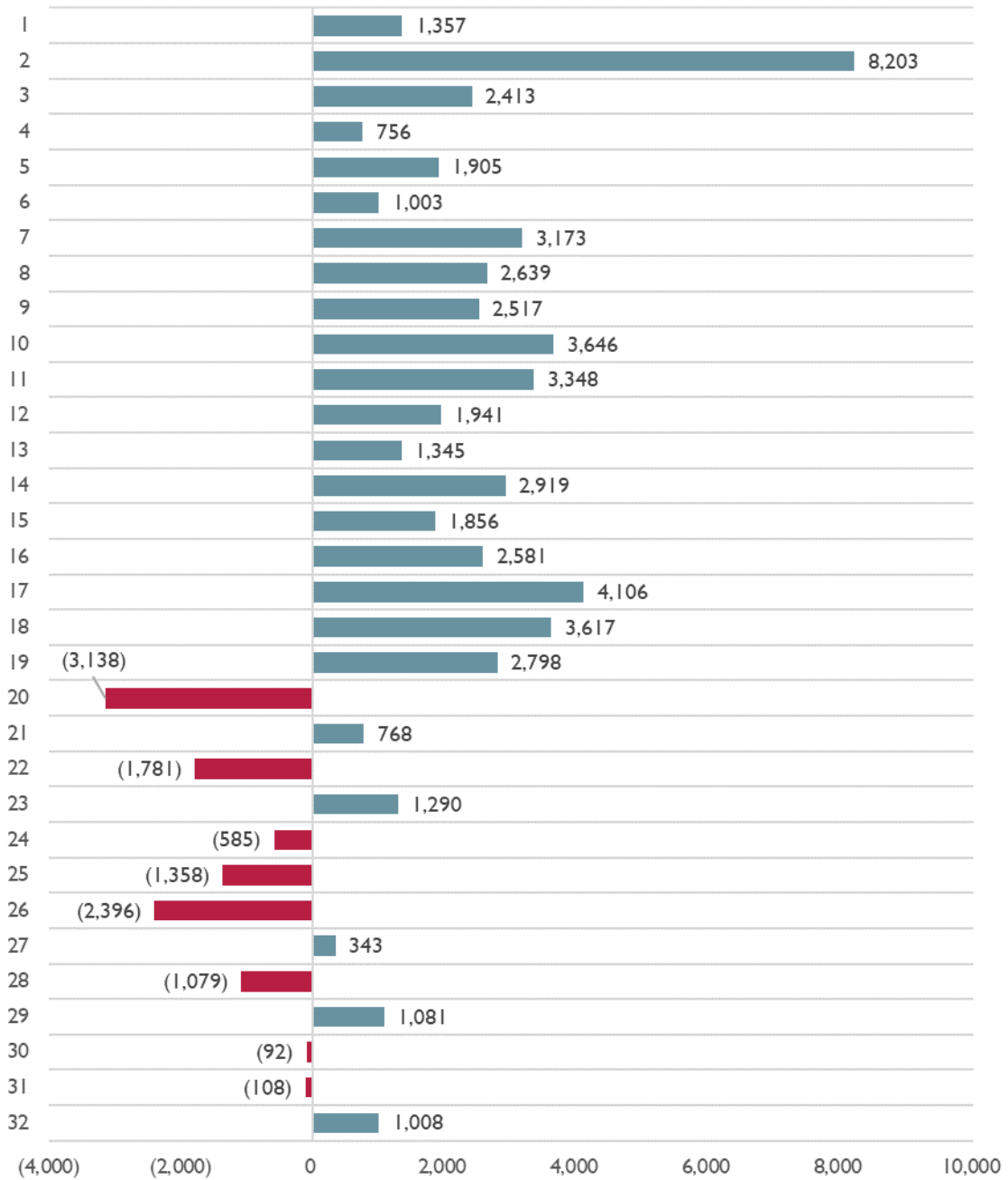

- There is an excess of high school seats across all districts in the Bronx, particularly in Districts 7, 10, and 11.

BUILDINGS & CAPACITY

- The Office of District Planning works closely with the School Construction Authority (SCA) and the Office of Space Management to understand how buildings are currently used and how capacity can best be used in future years.
- Each year, the SCA publishes the Blue Book, a tool that analyzes the capacity of each NYCPS building across the City and compares the target capacity with the number of enrolled students to determine a utilization rate for the building.
- Guiding Questions:
 - Given the current enrollment and capacity, does the district have sufficient capacity to meet its needs and support its students?
 - Is over- or under-utilization concentrated at a particular grade level? In a particular area?
 - Are there under-utilized buildings with excess capacity to accommodate an additional school or program?

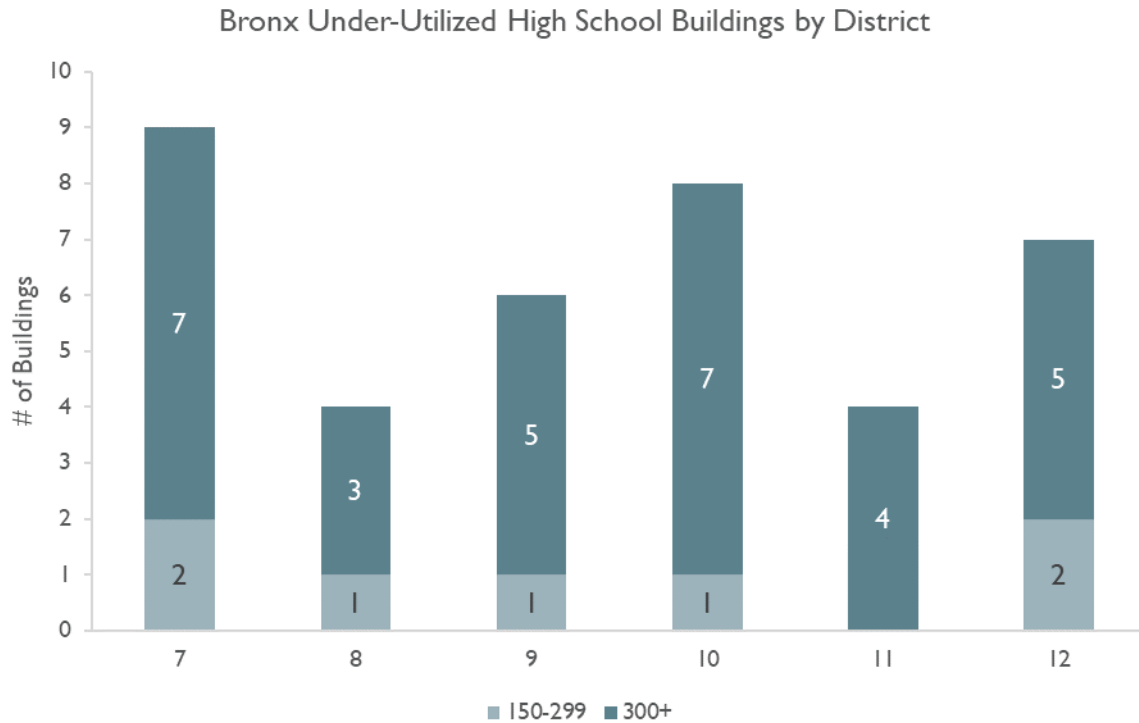

- There are 81 buildings in the Bronx serving high school students.
- 38 NYCPS buildings in the Bronx with high school students are under-utilized, meaning there is an excess of seats in these buildings.
 - District Planning works collaboratively with communities to identify how to optimize excess space in buildings, including adding programming where demand aligns to space.
- Seven NYCPS buildings in the Bronx with high school students are over-utilized, which suggests there may be crowding and/or space challenges at those schools.

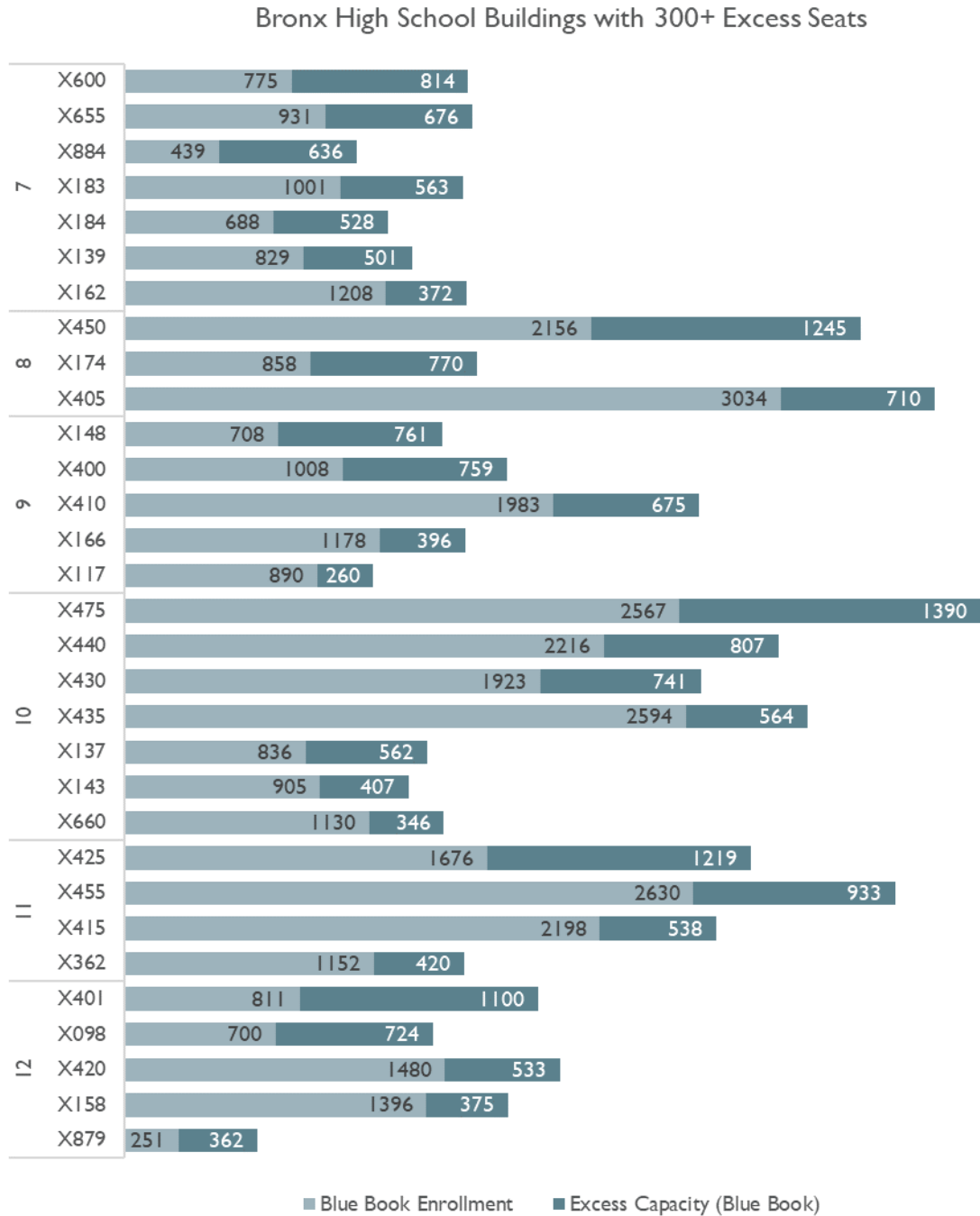
Bronx Under-Utilized High School Buildings by District

Bronx High School Buildings with 300+ Excess Seats

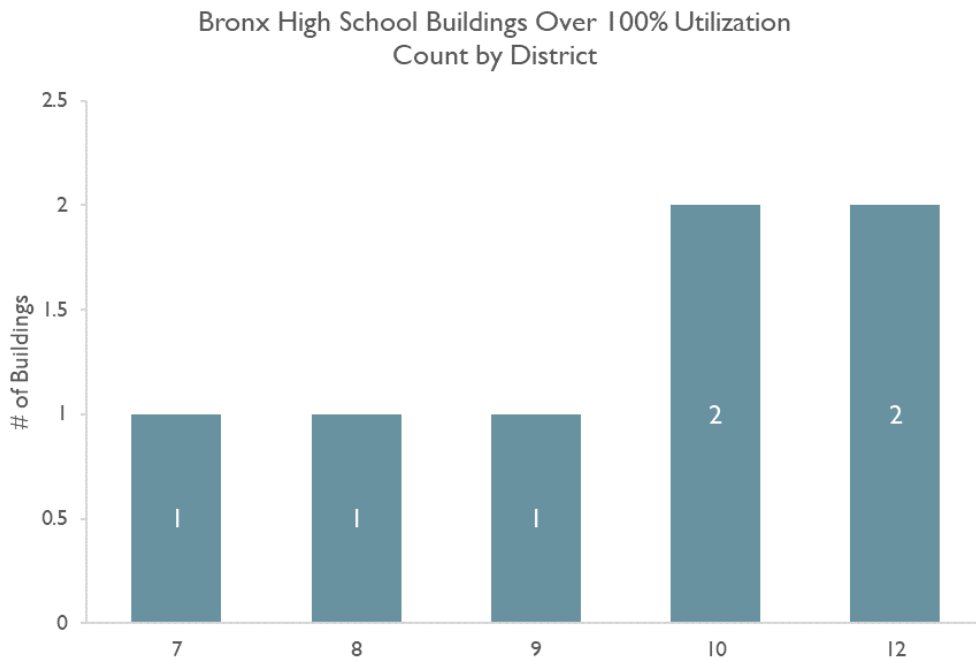

- Utilization rates do not always capture the full narrative of space in a building but provide a starting point for assessing potential space availability. For example, some buildings, although under-utilized, may not have sufficient space to add new schools or programming.
- Other buildings have significant excess seats and rooms.
- These could be candidates to address pressing district needs, including adding or expanding programs such as dual language offerings, District 75 programming, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Nest and Horizon programs, and/or other district needs where demand aligns.
- Building X098 houses Bard High School Early College Bronx, which is a new school phasing in that will utilize the excess space available.
- Buildings X400 and X425 are high school campuses where mergers will go into effect in the 2024-25 school year.
- Building X600, the Alfred E. Smith High School Campus, houses Bronx Haven High School, Bronx Design and Construction Academy, and Alfred E. Smith Career and Technical Education High School and has many specialized classroom spaces.

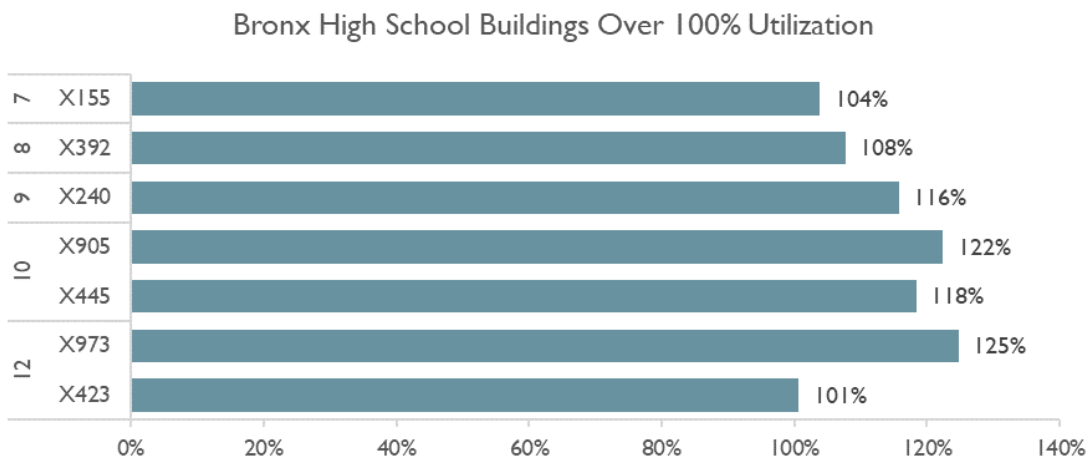

- There are seven NYCPS Bronx buildings serving high school students with utilization rates over 100%.
- Schools in these buildings may experience high demand, and therefore may be programming creatively to accommodate students.
 - Building X423 houses Mott Hall V, a secondary school, and Cinema School, a high school, which are both schools that receive significantly more true applications than seats.
- Districts 10 and 12 have the greatest number of over-utilized buildings in the borough.

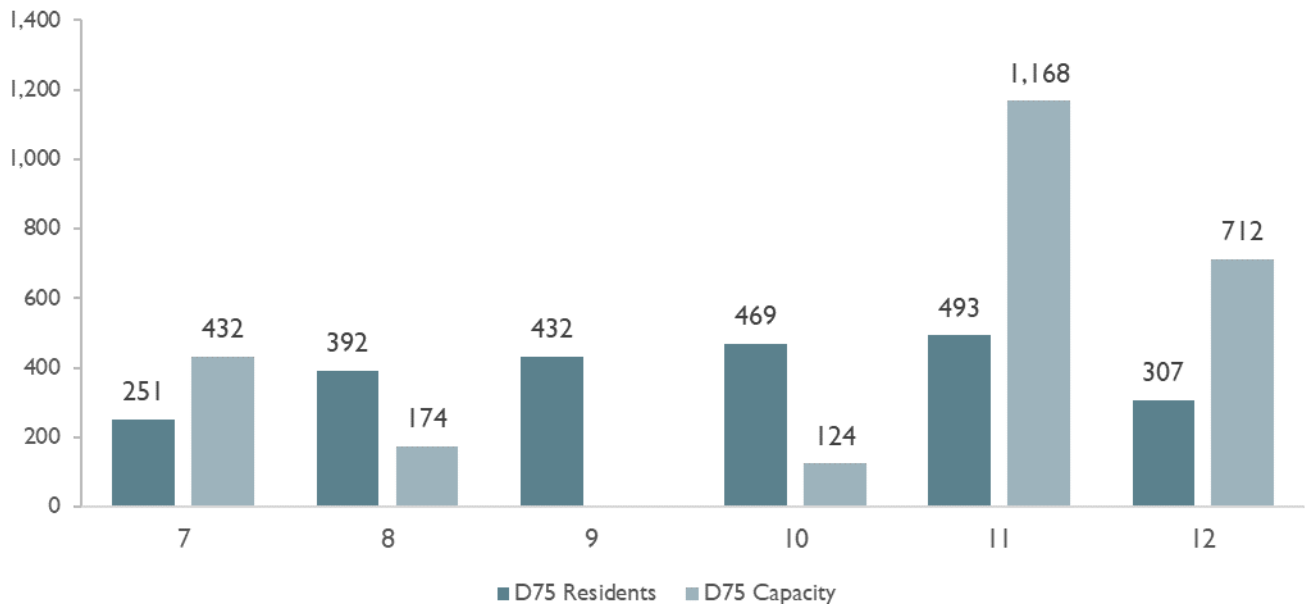
- The TCUs remaining at the Morris High School Campus in District 9 are in the process of being removed.

DISTRICT 75 SEAT NEED

- NYCPS’s District 75 provides highly specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), significant cognitive delays, emotional disturbance, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities.
- District 75 serves students through a number of different program models designed for students of different ages and education needs.
 - Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools.
 - A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.
- Guiding Questions:
 - Does the district have a need for more District 75 seats?
 - Are there potential options for new District 75 sites to provide opportunities for students to attend programs closer to their homes?

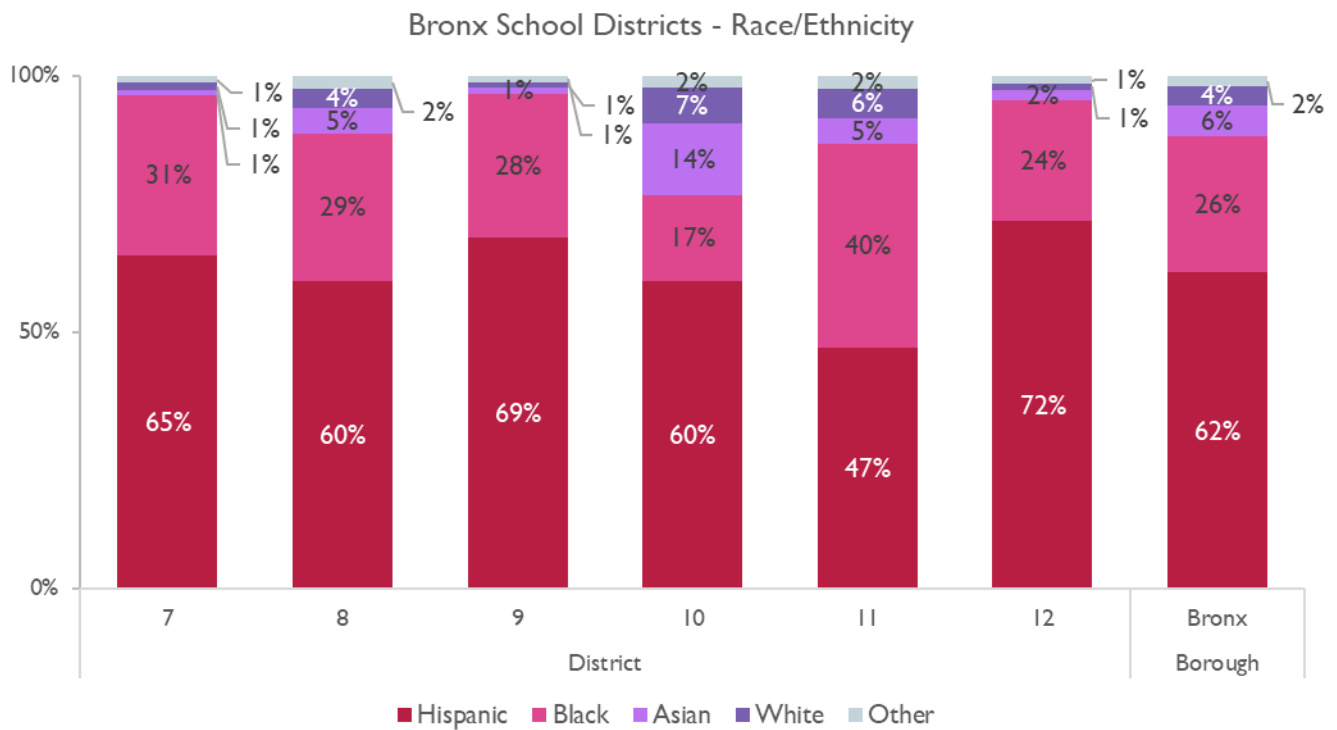
- District 75 serves students in a variety of settings across Bronx high schools based on the Individualized Educational Programs (IEPs) of individual students.
- Overall, the Bronx has enough seats to accommodate all District 75 high school students. However, seat capacity varies significantly across districts.
- There is currently a deficit of high school District 75 seats in Districts 8, 9, and 10. District 9 does not have any high school District 75 seats, which is likely to result in a much longer commute for these students to receive services.

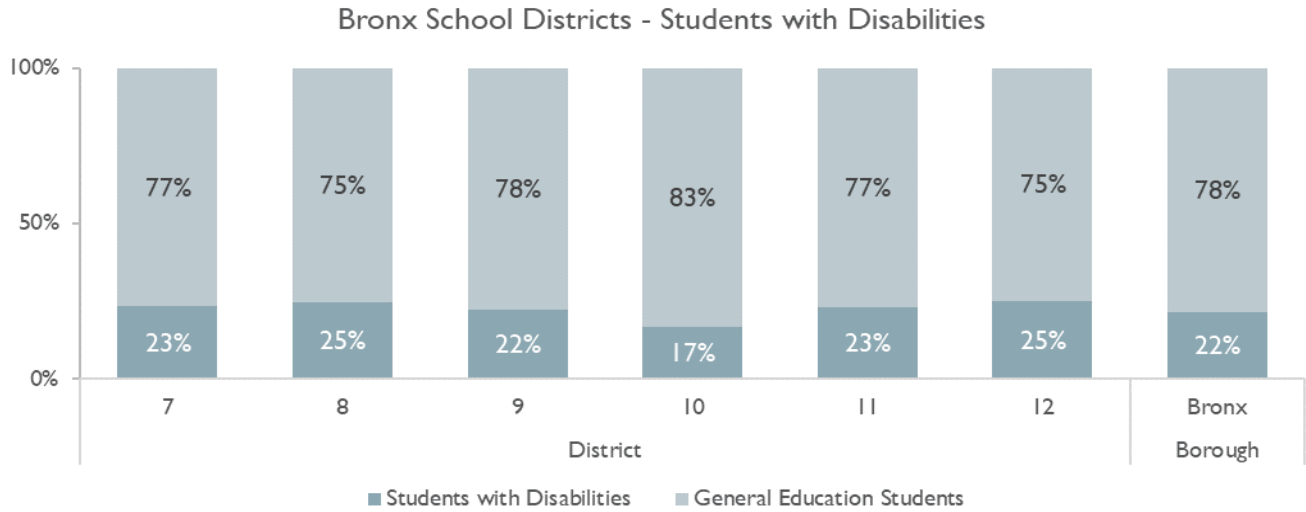
RACE/ETHNICITY

- Across the Bronx, 62% of high school students identify as Hispanic, 26% identify as Black, 6% identify as Asian, 4% identify as White, and 2% identify as Other.
- The racial breakdowns of high schools in Districts 7, 9, and 12 most closely resemble the borough average for Hispanic and Black students.
- District 10 serves the highest percentage of Asian students in the Bronx, and District 11 serves the highest percentage of Black students in the Bronx.

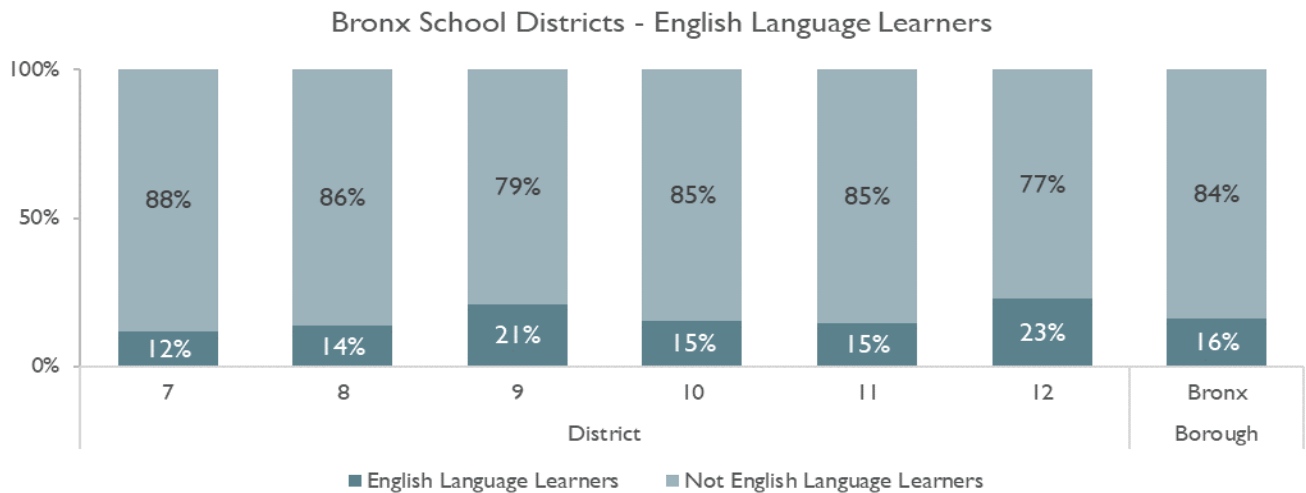
STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

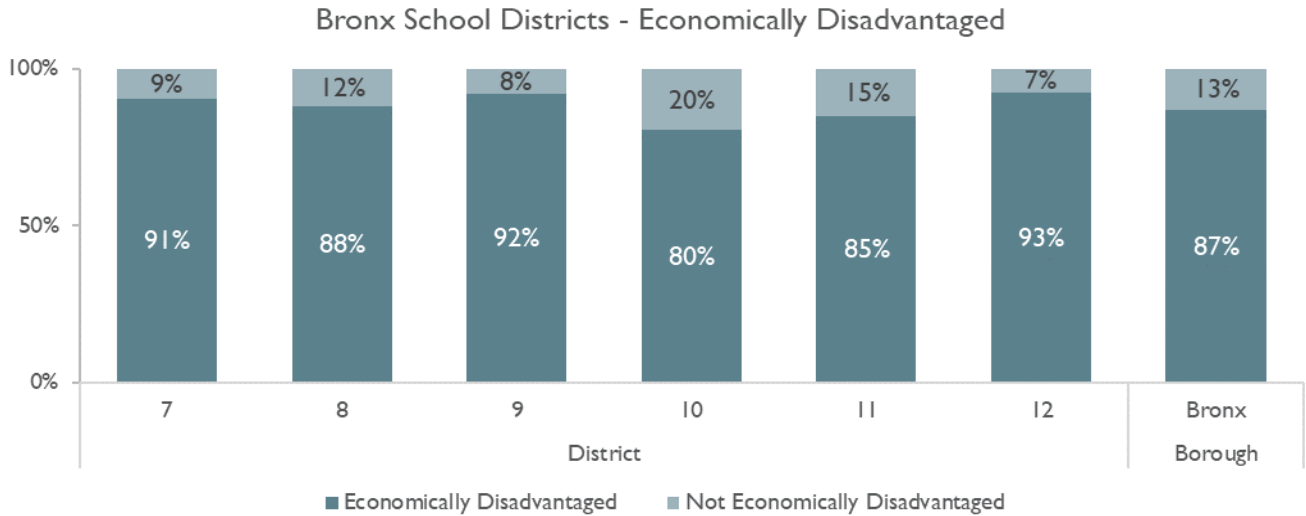
ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

- Districts 12 and 9 serve the largest percentages students who qualify for ELL services.

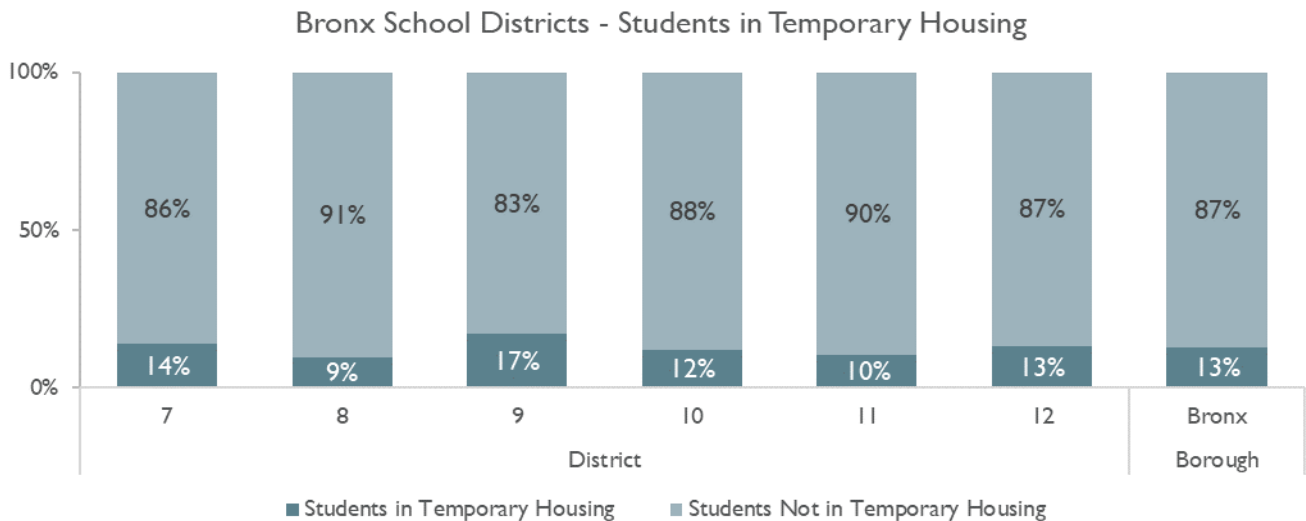
STUDENTS WHO ARE ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED

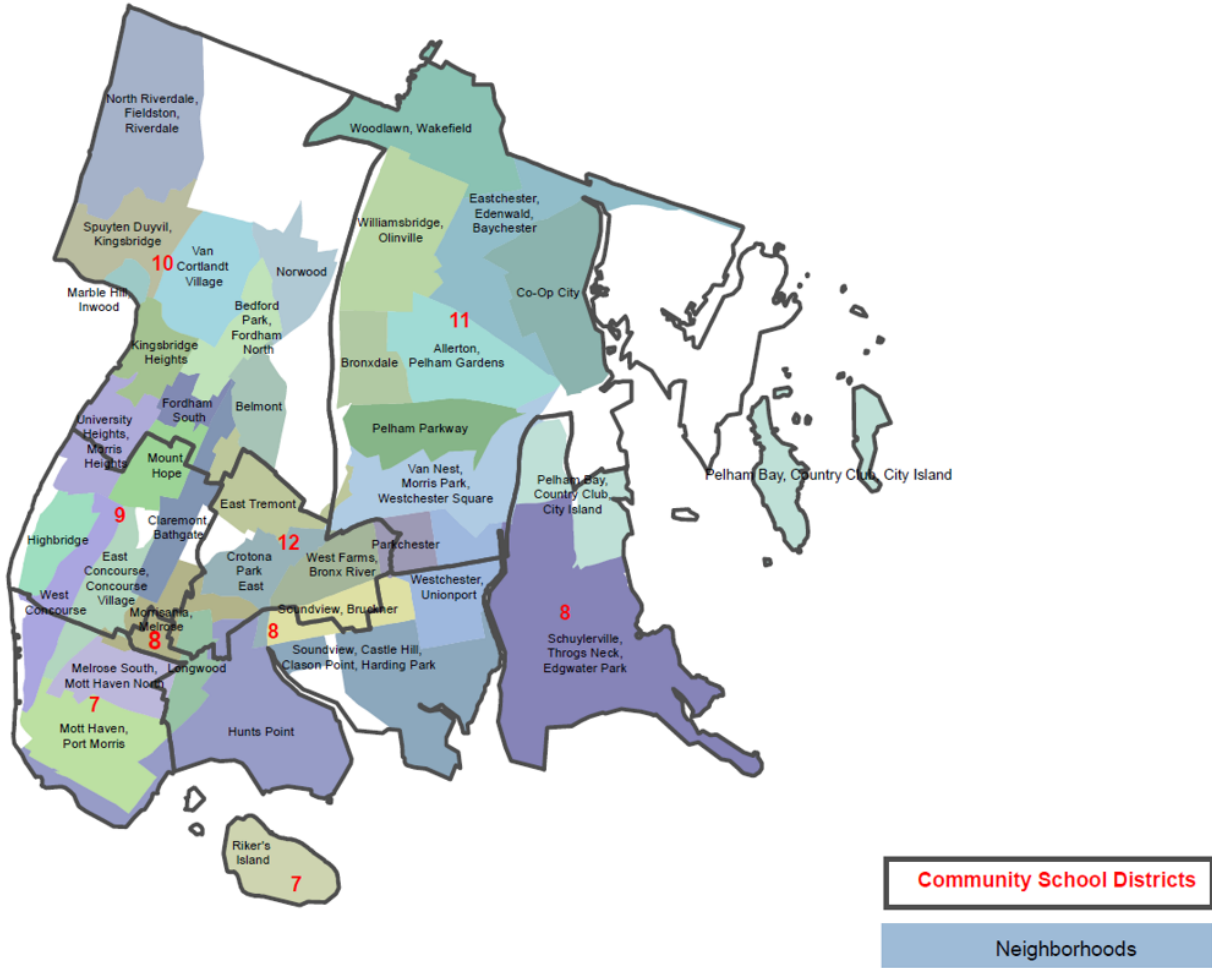

- District 10 has the greatest number of bilingual education programs, AP courses, and CTE programs.
