## CITYWIDE TRENDS

## CITYWIDE ENROLLMENT (DISTRICT AND CHARTER), 20I4-I5 TO 2023-24

New York City Public Schools (NYCPS) is committed to thoughtful collaboration with districts and communities to collectively strengthen schools, support students and families, and respond to demographic and population changes in New York City.

- Enrollment in D1-32 schools remained stable in 2023-2024 after declining by about $12 \%$ in the three school years since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Overall, K-12 enrollment in District 1-32 schools and charter schools has declined by about 11\% since its peak in the 2016-2017 school year.


## DISTRICT PLANNING PROCESS

- The Office of District Planning partners with communities, superintendents, and other stakeholders to identify solutions that address district needs, in accordance with Chancellor's Regulations A-185 and A-190.
- Chancellor's Regulation A-185 governs the process to re-zone or unzone schools in partnership with and voted on by Community Education Councils (CECs).
- Chancellor's Regulation A-190 governs the process to make any major changes to school utilization such as co-locations, school mergers, grade expansions and truncations, re-sitings, and other changes. A-190 proposals are voted on by the Panel for Educational Policy (PEP).
- Guiding Questions:
- How might recent changes affect the needs of the district as they are implemented? Do they address key needs and priorities?
- What other school changes could be considered?

- There have been relatively few major school changes in District 11 in recent years.
- In the 2024-25 school year, P.S. 108 will expand to serve grades K-8 in a new addition that is expected to open for the 2024-25 school year, adding seat capacity and providing space for P.S. 108 to grow.
- Additionally, in the 2024-25 school year, Bronx High School for Writing and Communication Arts will merge with Bronx Aerospace High School in building X425.


## DISTRICT ENROLLMENT TRENDS

## UNPACKING ENROLLMENT TRENDS

- Enrollment is a key data component in the District Planning Process. Enrollment data helps us identify trends, generate hypotheses, and understand where we need to dig deeper in partnership with our stakeholders.
- Guiding Questions:
- What has happened to district enrollment over the last six years overall? By incoming grade (Kindergarten, $6^{\text {th }}$ grade, and $9^{\text {th }}$ grade)? Are there notable trends?
- Are students remaining in the district to attend school? If not, where are they going?

- Since the 2018-2019 school year, district elementary school enrollment in District 11 declined by $22 \%$.
- Since the 2018-2019 school year, district middle school enrollment in District 11 declined by $17 \%$.
- These enrollment declines are less steep than the declines seen at the borough level. Bronx elementary school enrollment decreased by $27 \%$, while Bronx middle school enrollment decreased by $22 \%$ over the past five years.

- Over the last five years, total enrollment in District 11 declined by $18 \%$.
- The enrollment decline was most significant at the elementary school level (22\%), followed by the middle school level (17\%), and the high school level (16\%).
- In the last two years, total enrollment in District 11 remained stable.

Residential population is presented here as the sum of students attending any DOE school, charter or nonpublic school; as such, this metric will not capture students who are home schooled, have dropped out, or are otherwise not enrolled in these school options.

- Over the past five years, total District 11 K -12 aged residents decreased by $11 \%$, with the largest decrease seen among K-5 aged residents (almost 13\%).
- The decrease in the District $11 \mathrm{~K}-12$ aged residential population likely partially contributed to the decrease in District 11 enrollment over the past five years. However, in the past two years, total District 11 residents remained stable.

- Over the past five years, the share of District 11 K-5 aged residents enrolling in District 11 district elementary schools declined by eight percentage points.
- Over 60\% of District 11 K-5 aged residents enrolled in District 11 elementary schools in the 202324 school year.
- Over the past five years, the share of District 11 K-5 aged residents enrolling in charter schools increased by eight percentage points.
- Around one in five (22\%) of District 11 K-5 aged residents enrolled in a charter school in the 202324 school year.

- The share of District 11 6-8 aged residents enrolling in District 11 district middle schools decreased by seven percentage points over the past five years.
- About 61\% of District 11 6-8 aged residents enrolled in District 11 middle schools in the 202324 school year.
- The share of District 116-8 aged residents enrolling in charter schools increased by nine percentage points over the past five years.
- One in five District 11 6-8 aged residents (20\%) enrolled in charter schools in the 2023-24 school year.

- In District 11, 95\% of elementary school students and 79\% of middle school students who attend a District 11 school live in District 11.
- At the middle school level, $7 \%$ of students come from District 8 , and $6 \%$ of students come from District 10.

- The primary drivers of the decrease in elementary and middle school enrollment in District 11 over the past five years are a decline in District $11 \mathrm{~K}-8$ aged residents and an increase in District $11 \mathrm{~K}-8$ aged residents leaving the district to attend charter schools.
- District 11 elementary schools saw a sizable decrease (33\%) in K-5 aged residents leaving the district for non-public schools, but this decrease was not enough to offset the increase of District 11 K-5 aged residents leaving the district to attend charter schools (36\%).
- Similar to the elementary school level, there was also a decrease in District 116-8 aged residents leaving the district for non-public schools, but this decrease was not enough to offset the increase of District 11 6-8 aged residents leaving the district to attend charter schools (60\%).

[^0]- Almost half (49\%) of District 11 pre-K students stayed within the district for kindergarten for the 202223 school year.
- Additionally, almost half (47\%) of District 11 pre-K students left NYC or enrolled in non-district school options for kindergarten for the 2022-23 school year, with roughly one quarter ( $23 \%$ ) of District 11 preK students enrolling in a charter school for kindergarten.
- The percentage of pre-K students leaving NYC or enrolling in non-district school options for kindergarten grew by five percentage points in the past three years.
- Enrollment choices after pre-K in District 11 remained roughly the same over the past three years.

- $79 \%$ of District $115^{\text {th }}$ grade students stayed within the district for $6^{\text {th }}$ grade in the 2023-24 school year.
- $15 \%$ of District $115^{\text {th }}$ grade students left NYC or enrolled in non-district school options for $6^{\text {th }}$ grade in the 2023-24 school year, with only $6 \%$ of District $115^{\text {th }}$ grade students enrolling at a charter school for $6^{\text {th }}$ grade.
- Enrollment choices after $5^{\text {th }}$ grade in District 11 remained roughly the same over the past four years.

- $34 \%$ of District $118^{\text {th }}$ grade students remained in the district for $9^{\text {th }}$ grade in the $2023-24$ school year, while $46 \%$ enrolled at other district high schools outside of District 11.
- $20 \%$ of District $118^{\text {th }}$ grade students left NYC or enrolled in non-district school options for $9^{\text {th }}$ grade in the 2023-24 school year.
- Enrollment choices after $8^{\text {th }}$ grade in District 11 remained roughly the same over the past four years.

- The additions anticipated to be completed in the coming years allow for the opportunity to alleviate over-utilization across District 11.
- The X108 addition will add seat capacity, allowing P.S. 108 to expand from a K-5 to a K-8 school.
- District 11 is expected to continue to have excess seat capacity over the next year.
- Currently, there are over 1,000 excess seats at the elementary school level and over 2,500 excess seats at the middle school level in District 11.


## BUILDINGS \& CAPACITY

- The Office of District Planning works closely with the School Construction Authority (SCA) and the Office of Space Management to understand how buildings are currently used and how capacity can best be used in future years.
- Each year, the SCA publishes the Blue Book, a tool that analyzes the capacity of each NYCPS building across the City and compares the target capacity with the number of enrolled students to determine a utilization rate for the building.
- Guiding Questions:
- Given the current and projected capacity trends presented in the preceding Demand and Capacity section, does the district have sufficient capacity to meet its needs and support its students?
- Is over- or under-utilization concentrated at a particular grade level? In a particular area?
- Are there under-utilized buildings with excess capacity to accommodate an additional school or program?

- Utilization rates do not always capture the full narrative of space in a building, but provide a starting point for assessing potential space availability. For example, some buildings, although under-utilized, may not have sufficient space to add another school.
- Other buildings with significant excess seats could be candidates to address pressing district needs, including housing another school or adding or expanding programs such as dual language offerings, District 75 programming, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) programs, Gifted and Talented, and/or other district needs.
- Building X425 has 1,219 excess seats, the most excess space of any building in the district and houses schools serving grades 6-12 and 9-12. Two of the high schools co-located in this building, Bronx Aerospace and Bronx High School for Writing and Communication Arts, will merge in the 202425 school year.
- Buildings X455, X415 and X362 have the most excess seats of any buildings in the district. These buildings house secondary schools and/or high schools.
- Building X113 has 889 excess seats, the most excess space of any building serving middle school grades in the district.
- Building X087 is captured in the chart above because a new addition will open in September 2024, which will add additional seats and cause the building to be under-utilized.

## DISTRICT 75

- NYCPS's District 75 provides highly specialized instructional support for students with significant challenges, such as Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), significant cognitive delays, emotional disturbance, sensory impairment, and multiple disabilities.
- District 75 serves students through a number of different program models designed for students of different ages and education needs.
- Most District 75 students attend Special Class programs, which operate as distinct schools and may be located in standalone sites or co-located with district schools
- A smaller number of students attend Inclusion Programs, in which students receive District 75 services within general education classes at a district school partner.
- Guiding Questions:
- Does the district have a need for more District 75 seats?
- Are there potential options for new D75 sites to provide opportunities for students to attend programs closer to their homes?
