Introduction

In June 2020, the NYCDOE launched surveys to families (3K-12) and students (grades 6-12). The surveys were online, anonymous and available in all DOE-supported languages. The surveys closed on Monday, June 30.

Topics included: importance of health and safety precautions, comfort with wearing a mask in DOE buildings, scheduling preferences, and prioritization of activities for remote and in-person learning.








Comfort with Wearing Masks


Families: How comfortable would your child be with wearing a mask to school?








Students: How comfortable would you be wearing a mask to school?









Comfort with Coming Back to School Buildings

Families: How comfortable are you with sending your child to a school building every day this fall, if recommended health and safety measures, such as social distancing, are in place?




Students: How comfortable are you going to in-person school every day this fall, if there are health and safety measures like social distancing?






Preferred Option for Scheduling in the Fall


